Course Description:

The 5th grade Language Arts curriculum integrates reading, writing, speaking, listening, and the study of vocabulary and grammar in a way that engages today's learners and supports them in building a broad and diverse set of literacy skills. Students study classic literature as well as more contemporary forms, including media and multimedia products. Writing assignments in semester A focus on narrative and persuasive modes and emphasize the use of reasoning and details to support opinions. Each writing assignment spans several lessons and guides students through a writing process that begins with prewriting and ends by emphasizing one or more aspects of conventions of standard written English. Students also learn how to participate in collaborative discussion and peer review sessions. In each lesson, engaging and relevant models and step-by-step instruction guide students toward mastery and appreciation of 21st century communication in all its forms and functions.

	2.11: Far Out Fiction	 Identify elements of science fiction, including in a specific example of the genre. Apply reading strategies to a specific genre of fiction.
	2.12: Fate of the Future	Compare and contrast how stories in the same genre approach similar topics.
	2.13: Flawed or Fabulous?	Support an opinion with reasons and examples.
	2.14: Order in the Court	 Organize and group ideas logically to support an opinion. Create sections of an opinion essay, including introduction, body, and conclusion.

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	2.15: The Finer Points	 Revise an essay, expanding or combining sentences to eliminate sentence fragments. Revise an essay, using academic vocabulary to connect reasons to opinions. Edit an essay using a checklist.

	3.5: Search for Meaning	 Summarize a novel's sequence of events. Predict a novel's theme based on a partial sequence of events.
	3.6: Ask Why	 Make inferences about character traits in a novel. Analyze a character's motivations.
	3.7: Two of a Kind	 Compare and contrast two characters in a novel. Analyze the differences among characters.

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	3.8: Something Extra	 Define symbol. Interpret symbols in a novel. Analyze a novel's symbols as evidence of theme.
	3.9: Here and There	 Compare and contrast two or more settings in a novel, drawing on details in the text.
	3.10: Let's Investigate	 Analyze a scene or chapter in a novel, explaining its part in the story's overall structure.
