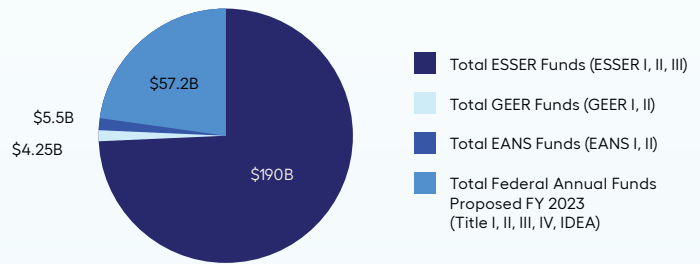
Emergency Relief and Annual Federal Program Funds

Funding Summary

\$257 billion

The nation continues to be well positioned to support critical PreK–12 education needs through the emergency relief funds provided under the CARES, CRRSA and ARP Acts, supplementing the U.S. Department of Education (USED) annual formula federal funds for fiscal year 2023.

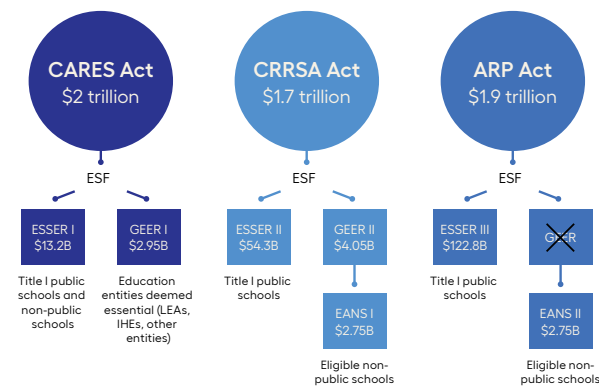
Federal Funding Summary (by awarded amounts)

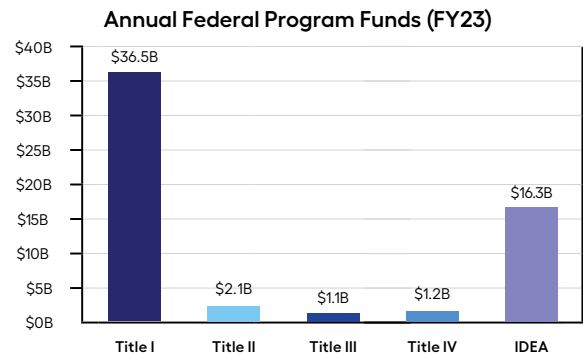
As part of the three emergency relief packages, the USED provided relief funding under its Education Stabilization Fund (ESF). Each act was structured to provide relief funding through the following programs: Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds (ESSER I, II, III), Governors Emergency Education Fund (GEER I, GEER II), and the Emergency Assistance for Non-public Schools (EANS I, EANS II). Annual Federal Program Funds

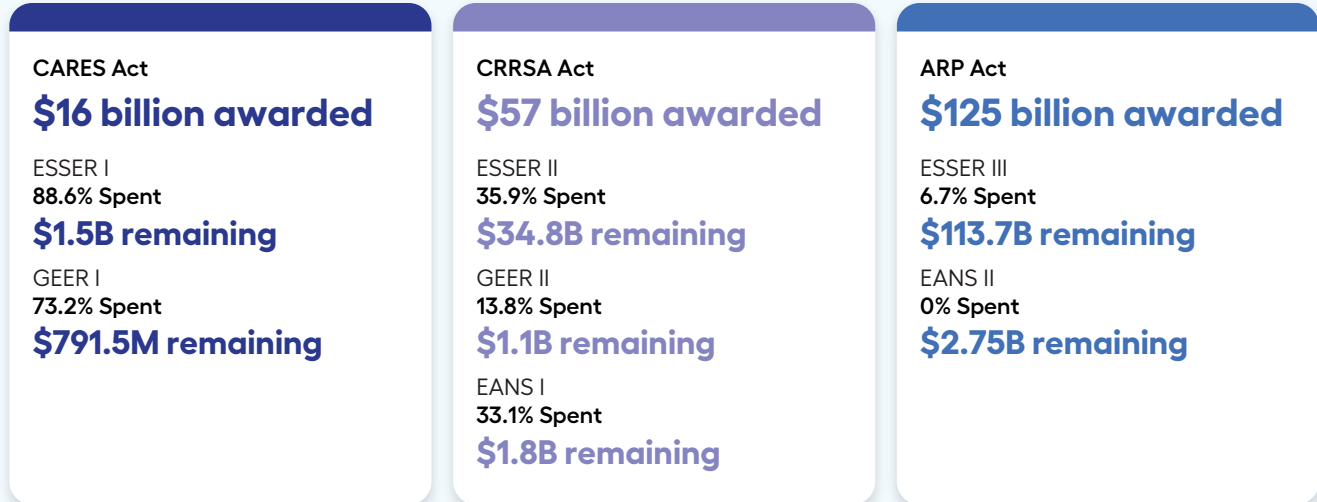
The federal government provides funding to all states on an annual basis through complex formulas determined by Congress. On average, the federal government contributes approximately 9% of the elementary and secondary education funds received per school year. The Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 USED proposed budget is significant, with total of \$88.3B in discretionary appropriations (\$13B above FY22 enacted). The most common federal funds (Title I, II, III, IV and IDEA) are used towards Imagine Learning’s qualified programs.



Emergency Relief Funds

The [CARES Act](#), [CRRSA Act](#), and [ARP Act](#) are aiding PreK-12 education with one-time, flexible emergency relief funds for eligible public and non-public schools.

Top Five Trends for ARP ESSER III Funds

#1 ACCELERATING LEARNING

Students returned from the pandemic with learning an average of 4 months behind in reading and 5 months behind in math. Educators' number one priority is helping students recover learning and move towards grade-level achievement.

#2 SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING

Educators are widely concerned about the mental, social, emotional, and physical well-being of students, teachers, and families. Addressing the entire community with empathy and humanity is critical both to student and teacher wellness, as well as academic success.

#3 FAMILY, STUDENT, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Hybrid learning highlighted how essential the school-home connection is to student success. Prioritizing community and family engagement should remain a top priority to support ongoing student achievement and stronger school-family collaborations.

#4 CONNECTIVITY AND BROADBAND

The pandemic highlighted and exacerbated inequities in access to technology and connectivity across the United States. ARP ESSER III funds are being used towards purchasing educational technology (including hardware, software, and connectivity).

#5 EDUCATOR RETENTION AND ADDRESSING TEACHER SHORTAGES

Difficulties teaching during the pandemic and general burnout has made it difficult for districts to keep quality educators on staff. Retaining educators has, therefore, emerged as a new spending priority.

A few reminders for State Education Agencies (SEAs), Local Education Agencies (LEAs) and schools to consider when using the ESSER I, II and III funds towards purchases:

- No Supplement-not-Supplant Rules
- No Title I (Part A) or ESSA Requirements
- Any School is Eligible to Receive Funds from LEAs
- Combine any of the ESSER Funds (I, II, III) towards Purchases
- Multi-year Contracts Permissible
- Deadlines to Obligate Funds are Coming Soon!
